When and why did you want to become a teacher?

I've always loved school, I loved school, I loved the schedule of school, I loved being in school, I loved all my teachers for the most part, so when I went to college, I really didn't know what I wanted to do. So I tried all these different things, I was a political science major, and I didn't like that at all. Then I really liked to paint and draw, so I took a bunch of art classes and really loved that but my parents weren't too excited about me being an artist, so I decided it will be a hobby of mine. So then I went to the Dean of Undeclared majors and they made me take an interest inventory and then they were like you really don't know what you want to do you're all over the place. So I really reflected on what I liked, and I liked school and I liked kids. So I majored in education and minored in psychology though because that was also something I was super interested in. So I majored in elementary and I got out of school, I went to Loyola for my undergrad and I became a kindergarten teacher and I loved it. Then they asked me to teach first grade so I taught first grade for a little bit and while I was there I started to get questions from parents on how to help their kids but in ways I didn't really know how to help them which caused me to go back to school and get a counseling degree. So when I was at Northeastern for my masters I had the choice to go into private practice, or go the school route and I knew I loved being in school and being around kids so I chose to be a school counselor and that's how I ended up at Ridgewood. I was a school counselor here for 9 years and during that time I was like "Oh! I think I'm going to go back to school again!" So I got a 2nd masters degree in school leadership administration.

Did you have any idea in mind like what job you wanted to do when you were in high school?

When I was in high school, I knew I wanted to go to college and that's as far as I got. I really loved Loyola and that's where I ended up going and that's where I really started to explore, and now I wish I had the opportunities that Ridgewood offers kids because you have the opportunity to really explore and really do the things you like to do before you spend a whole lot of money in college. I wish I had that. I worked at a grocery store called Dominick's in high school and I used to draw the advertisements in the produce section or the deli section because I was really good at art so they hired me to do all the advertisements. And I worked as a cashier so I worked there throughout high school and college too.

Did you ever see yourself one day becoming an administrator?

No, I did not see it. I knew I wanted to do more. So when the Dean of Students job opened, I realized it's really a lot like counseling because you're talking to students and you're trying to direct them and figure out. My whole thing as Dean was never treat the symptom. Behavior is a symptom of something deeper going on and to figure out the root cause of what's happening and try to get that other person to understand that to change behavior. So I jumped into being Dean. I really liked that job a lot. Mr. Uhle was Principal and then Assistant Principal opened up and he said you would be really good at this and I became Assistant Principal and then Uhle left and he told me I should really go for being Principal. If you told me 22 years ago when I was a kindergarten teacher that I was going to become a high school Principal I would have said "absolutely not".

Then we fostered again and 4 dogs were too many so we found a really good home for her and she's so in love with her owner and she lives a really good life and we get updates about her all the time.

I would have to say, I don't think it's one person. I think it's anyone who has overcome something in their lives and persevered. Perseverance is a really inspiring thing for me because it's easy to give up. It's so much harder to suck it up and press on. Anyone who has dealt with anything hard in their life, no matter what it is, just falls down and gets up and falls down and gets up and just keeps moving forward, those are my heroes.

I would love to go back to Italy. Just travel all around Italy and eat the food and see things. I went twice and once was with ms. Miller on the field trip and I loved it there. I would love to go back there.
