WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN CHRONIC ABSENCE AND TRUANCY?

As the concept of chronic absenteeism gains traction across the country, some people are under the mistaken impression that it's just a politically correct way of saying truancy. Educators, policymakers and journalists often use the words interchangeably, describing the same, old problem with the same, old solution.

In fact, the two terms describe different aspects of our absenteeism problem and require different approaches to bringing students back to school every day.

First, let's take truancy, a term that generally refers to unexcused absences. In the past, federal law required states to track truancy but left it to states to come up with the definition. California schools have tracked the number of students who are truant which is defined as missing three days without a valid excuse or are late three times to class by 30 minutes. In contrast, in Maryland, schools have monitored habitual truancy, defined as missing 20% of the school year (which is 38 days in a 180 day school year).

With its focus on unexcused absences, truancy naturally leads to a focus on compliance with the rules. Students are missing school without an excuse, skipping school and violating mandatory attendance requirements. Fixing the problem becomes a question of ensuring compliance, often left to front-office administrators, and in the most severe cases, to the legal system. Policymakers often recommend punitive consequences for truancy – such as suspensions, jail time and fines – for children and parents. Some communities and courts have devised effective approaches to reducing truancy, but in other places, punitive efforts are pushing students out of school.

Chronic absenteeism, on the other hand, incorporates all absences: excused, unexcused and suspensions. The focus is on the academic consequences of this lost instructional time and on preventing absences before students miss so much school that they fall behind. It recognizes that students miss school for many understandable issues such as asthma or homelessness or unreliable transportation, for which a punitive response is not appropriate. But what helps is working with families to share the importance of attendance and to fix the underlying problems that lead to absenteeism.

Given this broader focus, addressing chronic absenteeism becomes an issue for the entire community. Medical providers can help address health challenges; transit and housing agencies can resolve other barriers to attendance; volunteers from businesses and faith communities can mentor students and support families. These approaches can also reduce truancy.

Like truancy, chronic absence has no common definition, though many researchers and schools monitor how many students are missing 10 percent or more of the school year. That's about two days a month, or 18 days in most school districts. The U.S. Education Department's Office of Civil Rights this spring will release data showing how many students miss 15 or more days.

This data represents the first time that many schools and districts will know how many students are missing so much school that they are falling behind academically. What's the right response to this new information? Rather than launching a punitive crackdown, educators and community partners should use the opportunity to dig deep into their numbers to determine who is missing too much school and why. Taking a data informed, non-punitive approach that draws upon insights from students, families, teachers and community partners is what leads to strategies that can improve attendance and achievement.

Entering Absence Request

This allows you to notify your student's school when your student will be absent.

- 1. Click Enter Absent Request.
- 2. Select Add Request.
- 3. Enter the Start Date and Time and the End Date and Time.
- 4. Click the drop-down list to select a Reason why your student will be absent.
- 5. If desired, enter a Comment.
- 6. Click Save. Note that the Status is pending and awaiting approval from the attendance office.

You also have the capability to Edit the record, as well as to Delete the request.

SAT/Khan Academy

The April 5th SAT administration date is right around the corner. All juniors have access to personalized test prep through Khan Academy, which has also been implemented into our Math and English curriculum. Students must have both a College Board and Khan Academy account to access the personalized program. All students should have created and linked both accounts during their English classes. Ridgewood will offer a comprehensive two day test prep program (at a cost) through ZAPS, a company specializing in teaching the strengths and weaknesses of the SAT. Details will be provided in the coming weeks.

Athletic Update

Dance/Poms

Coach Daniela Briguglio and the Poms squad recently completed their IHSA Competitive Dance season. They competed on Saturday, January 21 at Huntley High School for the IHSA Sectional Championship and finished 7th Place (out of 16 teams). Unfortunately for our girls only the top six teams advance to the IHSA State Championships. The weekend prior, the team competed in the Metro Suburban Conference Dance/Cheer Competition at Elmwood Park High School and earned 4th place overall. While their competitive season is over, they will still perform at home basketball games and plan to have their Senior-Parent Night on February 21st at the last home boys basketball game of the season.

<u>Cheer</u>

First year Head Coach Barbara Carabio and the Cheer team recently competed in the IHSA Sectionals at Conant High School on January 28, 2017. The team wrapped up a successful competitive season placing 9th overall in the Sectional. The team also had back to back competitions, placing 4th place at the Niles West Invitational and the next day the girls earned 5th place at the Metro Suburban Conference Dance/Cheer Competition. The Cheer Team will continue their sideline spirit at the boys and girls basketball games. The Cheerleaders are also having a "Kiddie Clinic" on February 14th and 16th from 4 to 6 pm. The participants of the camp will perform at halftime of the Boys Basketball game on February 17th against Chicago Christian. Their Senior-Parent Night on February 21st at the last home boys' basketball game of the season.

Wrestling

Head Coach Jordan Lima is in his first year as head coach of the wrestling team at Ridgewood High School. He has a very young team, with no seniors on the squad. Despite being young, the team has shown tremendous growth over their long season. Over the course of the season, the team participated in the Vernon Hills Invite, Leyden Invite, and several quads and duals against non-conference and conference opponents. Most recently, Ridgewood hosted a quad on January 19, 2017 and a dual on January 24th. Sandwiched in between these events was the Metro Suburban Conference Wrestling Championship, hosted by Elmwood Park. The team finished 7th Place overall, out of the 11 schools in our conference that have wrestling teams. Next on the horizon is the IHSA Regional, hosted by Fenton High School on February 4, 2017.

Boys Basketball

Coach Chris Mroz and the boys' basketball program started off the season as Champions of The "Battle at the Ridge" Tournament and went 5-0 in their first five games. Over Winter Break the team traveled out to DeKalb High School where they earned Third Place at the competitive Chuck Dayton Holiday Tournament. The boys recently wrapped up a very tough week against some of the strongest talent in the area - Loyola Academy, Notre Dame and Glenbard South. Unfortunately, the team suffered three losses during that stretch. The team rebounded nicely with conference victories over Walther Christian Guerin Prep. Their Senior-Parent Night on February 21st at the last home boys' basketball game of the season (against MSC rival Elmwood Park High School).

Girls Basketball

Head Coach Amanda Timothy and the Girls Basketball team started the season earning a 4th Place finish in the Second Annual RHS Thanksgiving Tournament. The team also played terrific basketball in the Guerin Prep "Yuletide Classic" Tournament over Winter Break, where they earned 3rd Place honors. The girls have a few more regular season games before they look to start the IHSA Regionals (site and opponent is yet to be determined).
